Building Reopening Task Force Update

In late April, the Covid Act Now and Centers for Disease Control risk level for community spread of the coronavirus in our area fell to Low Risk. The Building Reopening task force met and was prepared to recommend to the Board that they remove the mask mandate and food/drink restrictions in the Fellowship building. But before the Board could meet on May 12th everything changed. The Coronavirus Omicron sub-variant began spreading and within a week we were back up to a Medium risk. The task force tabled their recommendations and only brought forward a suggestion that we allow small groups to have food and drink in the building. And so, we have continued to require that masks be worn in the building.

We know this is different than what is required in most public spaces. We are very appreciative of everyone's cooperation and commitment to safety for all our congregants. We have been able to hold worship services, religious education classes and social events at the Fellowship with no incidents of community spread. Fortunately, the latest upsurge in infections has turned out to be much more modest than the original Omicron surge during the winter. And there have been far fewer hospitalizations and deaths.

As of today, June 22, 2022, everyone 6 months and older is eligible for vaccination. The Weekly New Cases index is falling steadily and is very close to crossing the line into the Low Risk factor. When that happens, the Building Reopening task force will likely meet again and discuss whether to recommend changes to the current Group Gathering policy like we did in April. If the policy changes, we will inform the congregation through all our communication channels. Until then, we ask that you continue to adhere to the current Group Gathering policy.

Board Business

A report to the congregation on business acted on by the Board at its regular monthly meeting on June 9.

- Bill Brooks, representing the UUFF Healthy Relations Team, outlined the team's organization, plans, and activities. The Healthy Relations Team was appointed by the Board to help Fellowship congregants remain in covenant with each other following the adoption of the Congregational Covenant at the Annual Meeting in 2020. This team will also strive to heighten the congregation's awareness of the Covenant.
- Rev. Doug reported that the members of the Internship Committee and the staff met with Roddy Biggs on June 3; Roddy was in Fredericksburg to find housing for the Fall. The committee chose Eunice Haigler and Curt Swinburne as co-chairs.
- Two changes were made to the Intern Minister Contract:
 - Roddy will start his internship on September 15th rather than September 1st
 - o In line with new UUA guidance, Roddy's contract will call for 1,000 hours to be served during his internship.
- The Board discussed additional proposed changes to the Finance Committee's Internal Controls procedures that were adopted at the May meeting.
- Lois noted that the terms of three Board members will end on June 30: Craig Cherry, Steve Elstein, and Lydia Zambon. The Board thanked them for the many services that they have provided to the Fellowship.
- New officers for Fiscal Year 23 were elected. Kit Carver will serve as President and Alex Grissom will serve as Vice-President. The election of Secretary was deferred until the July meeting.
- Ron Wasem was appointed as Treasurer and Bob McNichols and Hannelore Montgomery were appointed as Assistant Treasurers.
- The Board established \$144 as the minimum contribution of record in order to be a Member in Good Standing of the Fellowship.
- Lois Colbridge's request to serve as a voting delegate at the UUA General Assembly, June 22-26, was approved. Lois will be attending virtually.

After approval by the Board, the full minutes of each meeting are available in the <u>Document Repository</u>. The Board meets the second Thursday of each month at 7:30 p.m. on <u>Zoom</u>. UUFF friends and members are welcome to attend.

Oh, how nice it felt to be with kindred souls at a mass demonstration. On June 18, Karen Kallay and I ventured up to D.C. by Amtrak to answer the Poor People's Campaign National Call for a Moral Revival. We joined thousands of people from all over the nation for the Mass Poor People's and Low-Wage Worker's Assembly. I marched in local Black Lives Matter rallies here in Fredericksburg in 2020, but it's been a while. It felt great to finally be

back on the streets amongst a massive crowd demanding social justice.

Karen and I met up with other UU's wearing our yellow Side With Love shirts at 4th and Pennsylvania Ave, NW. We got there so early that we walked right up to the front. Within an hour the street filled up for 5 blocks. There were signs, banners, and makeshift props to protest our nation's upside-down values which allow 140 million people to live in poverty or work for inadequate wages in the richest country on the planet. We heard fiery speeches from Rev. William Barber, Cornell West, and Bernice King about the evils of poverty, racism and militarism that disproportionally affect our marginalized populations. We heard stories from people living in poverty in every state in the union. We heard prayers from a wide spectrum of religions and danced to amazing music. We heard about practical ways that we can build power, shift the narrative, and make real policies to fully address poverty and low wealth from the bottom up.

And we were repeatedly reminded of how crucial the upcoming election is if we want our elected officials to act on our demands for universal health care, living wages and a redistribution of the bloated war economy.

We were hoping that more people from the Fellowship could have joined us, but it warmed my heart to hear about how many of you attended Juneteenth celebrations around town. Now that the weather is warm, and we can safely congregate outside, it is time to gather in the public square and advocate for justice. This is one of the things that differentiates Unitarian Universalism from many of the other religions. We believe in heaven on earth, and we are willing to organize and mobilize to make it happen. Our social justice committee is dedicated to partnering with larger organizations so that we can maximize our voices. We plan to work with the UU the Vote campaign for national election justice and



Virginia Organizing for local issues that affect our community. The committee's job is to let you know when there is an action being planned that aligns with our values. It is up to all of us to respond. This is not a spectator sport. It is faith in action. We can use you to work the phone bank, send messages to our legislators and to show up at rallies. Please consider how you can make a difference and be ready to get into some good trouble.

Volunteer for Meals on Wheels

Among older adults who have difficulties with daily activities, 2 out of 3 receive limited or no home or community-based care.

Meals on Wheels is a national organization that serves every community by delivering meals to elderly people and those with disabilities who are unable to prepare or provide meals for themselves. They receive 35% of their funding from the US government. The cost to produce and deliver meals averages \$6.00 - \$7.00 per meal. Most programs ask low-income seniors to contribute what they can, with a suggested donation of \$3.00 per meal being common.

You can help your local Meals on Wheels effort by volunteering to deliver or prepare meals, assist in other ways, and by donating.
