Sunday Worship

It takes a village to lead worship. Our Sunday services are a collaboration of many people's talents and passions. There are just as many volunteers working behind the scenes as the people on the chancel to pull off the spiritual, intellectual, and embodied worship we have come to expect. Here at UUFF we run a full-service, year-around Sunday worship service program. It takes planners, speakers, preachers, technicians, and musicians working together in the full expression of Shared Ministry. The worship that you attend on Sundays begins months ahead with Rev. Doug and the Sunday Services Committee planning topics and speakers. Worship Associates are assigned to find readings. Choirs rehearse weeks in advance. The order of service is created, and flowers are placed on the chalice table. Hannelore Montgomery cleans the building the night before. Greeters arrive early on Sunday. The audio-visual technicians turn everything on and do their sound checks. Congregants and visitors file into the sanctuary and the bowl is rung. At that point, the collective spirit in the room takes over and the worship enfolds.

We are indebted to the generous contributions of time and talent from these volunteers who together with the UUFF staff enrich our lives with inspirational worship every week. August 7 The Interdependent Web Through Song, Elaine Silver

Elaine Silver is a Spirited woman with a Musical Ministry that centers around New Thought Philosophy and a deep love and respect for Mother Earth and our own Interconnectedness. Elaine brings her audiences to places of Ancient Wisdom and Truth that resonate fully in the heart, mind and soul of those wise enough to listen.

August 14 Indigent Healthcare, Karen Dulaney and Patrick Neustatter

Despite the Affordable Care Act there are still approximately 30 million people in the US who have no healthcare coverage (and the number is climbing steadily). These people get inferior healthcare and often finish up with multiple chronic medical conditions. "Safety net" organizations like the Lloyd Moss Free Clinic provide care for these so called "medically indigent." Executive Director Karen Dulaney and Medical Director Dr. Patrick Neustatter will talk about the challenges of providing care for these dispossessed, with some discussion of why there is a need and solutions.

August 21 The Healing Power of Self-Compassion, Todd Drake

In this culture of self-esteem, we often find ourselves on the losing end of comparing ourselves to others, which can marginalize our sense of self-worth and make us feel deeply alone. But there is a more wholesome alternative. Through the practice of mindful self-compassion, we come to see that we are not alone in our suffering and can embrace our imperfections as a part of being human. We learn to treat ourselves with great kindness by constructing an inner friend that lends us the warmth and understanding we need to feel fully alive.

August 28 The Iowa Sisterhood, Rev. Doug McCusker

After the Civil War, as settlers pushed further west into the North American heartland, Unitarian and Universalists established churches along the so-called Western frontier. This created a minister shortage in places where the Eastern bred male ministers did not want to go. What developed was an anomaly of the time. For about 40 years women were ordained and became pastors in many Unitarian churches west of the Mississippi River. In this brief period that ended in the 1920's, female ministers introduced innovations that changed how ministry was done. Female UU ministers did not re-emerge until the 1970's. Join us as we look back at the contributions to ministry of the Iowa Sisterhood.
