#### Speaking of Abundance

Are you a Chalice Lighter? I am. Twice a year I get a letter from the Southeastern District

of the UUA requesting help for one of the UU churches in the district. They are renovating an old building or hiring a minister or expanding their space and need some help with these expenses. So, I write a check for \$15 and send it off in the mail (because I am a Luddite). I could also send it online.

My small check is one of many from the UUFF, and our Fellowship is one of many in Virginia. The Southeastern District covers many states. So you see how it works: \$15,000 becomes available for a small church that needs and wants a minister but could never afford it alone.

Our Fellowship has benefited twice from Chalice Lighter grants. The first time was when we had our first full-time minister, Rev. John Rex. The UUA subsidies ended after two years and we applied for a Chalice Lighter grant. The money from Chalice Lighters allowed us to pay his salary for another year. The second time was soon after we moved into our new building. We needed many things but applied to Chalice Lighters for the sound panels that are now in the main hall of our Fellowship. This extra bit of money allowed us to get rid of the echo effect that so many folks complained about in those first months in the new building. It was truly a godsend.

It is easy to be a Chalice Lighter: send your name, address and tell them that you are from the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Fredericksburg (no abbreviations). Mail your information to: Southern Region Chalice Lighters, PO Box 560246, Orlando, FL, 32856. Send NO money. You will receive a call within 6 months or so to help a congregation in need and then you send out your \$15 check. Easy. It feels good to write that check, knowing that it will help another UU congregation. I expect that one day it will come back to us because we hope to be the recipient of another grant in coming years.

We are focusing on Stewardship this month, and pledging to support our Fellowship. Let's go one step further from our place of abundance, and become a Chalice Lighter.

Good news from the Virginia General Assembly! Both anti-immigrant bills were defeated. Dreamers will keep the right to in-state tuition and principals will not have to intimidate immigrant children by requiring proof of immigration status at enrollment. But there is still much work to be done.

We are working hard in our area in coalition with local immigrant rights groups to help members of our community prepare to apply for DAPA and the expanded DACA, the deferred deportation programs President
Obama created through
executive action. However, while these
programs are a big step forward, they are
temporary and offer no path to permanent
legal status.

## **Young Adult Spring Lobby Weekend**

March 14-17, 2015

Calling all young adults age 18-35 interested in climate justice! UUSC and the UU College of Social Justice are working together to pilot new skills-based trainings that combine learning and hands-on advocacy opportunities.

Our first venture will be a 4-day training in Washington, D.C. The Spring Lobby Weekend will feature a "deep dive" look at current climate justice issues and the need for changes in federal policy. We'll offer lobbying training and Capitol Hill meetings with legislators. We're part-

nering with the Friends Committee on National Legislation and the Franciscan Action Network, so participants will have a chance to work with young adults from various faith traditions. There will also be some optional fun free time activities.

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## MINISTERIAL SEARCH UPDATE

#### Frequently Asked Questions:

## Was the search committee able to consider all the UU ministers in search?

The committee could only consider those ministers who first expressed an interest in us, after reviewing our online congregational record. We were then given access to the ministerial records of those ministers who chose us as a potential match, and we were able to select our best candidates from that pool. Having ministers choose us first insured that we focused our energies only on those ministers with whom there was mutual interest.

## How could any minister not be interested in the UUFF?

Iknow, we're so great, right?! Nonetheless, ministers are often searching for a particular geographic location, are looking for a congregation of a specific size, or have certain salary requirements. There may be personal needs to take into account, such as employment opportunities in a partner's career field. Some ministers may prefer a position as part of a ministry team, rather than as sole minister. And for others, our needs and interests simply don't dovetail with their skills.

## How did the search committee narrow down the list of interested ministers?

The ministerial records of all interested ministers were made available to us for careful review, and we then exchanged information packets with them. For those candidates that rose to the top of our list, we arranged lengthy Skype interviews, which included questions that touched on a variety of aspects of ministry. From these interviews and the candidates' packets, including consideration of their sermons, worship skills, pastoral care experience, religious education interests, and much, much more, we came up with those ministers we felt would be the best fit for our congregation.

#### What is a "neutral pulpit"?

We arranged weekend visits with our top candidates in February and March. These visits enable the candidates to get their first look at Fredericksburg, and include ample time for deeper conversations with the committee. On Sunday morning, the committee travels to another UU church to see the candidate preach at a "neutral pulpit" (a church other than ours or theirs). These visits are confidential to protect the privacy of the candidates, so specific details will not be made public.

## What happens after the committee chooses the best candidate?

After we have spent time with all of our top candidates, we decide which of them would be a great fit for the UUFF. All churches in search make their offers to their preferred candidate on the same day in April. Ideally, this minister will accept our invitation to "candidating week" which will occur in April or May. This Sunday-to-Sunday week of activities gives the congregation the opportunity to attend two worship services led by our ministerial candidate, as well as a

number of other events designed to help us get to know the new minister more fully.

Candidating week culminates with the congregational vote on the new minister.

## Why do we only get to see one candidate?

In accordance with UUA guidelines, congregations in search entrust the search committee to make the best choice. The committee has spent many hours (so many hours!) defining the needs and wants of the congregation, reviewing candidates' materials, interviewing them extensively, hearing them preach, and evaluating whether they can provide the skills we need. If we were to bring two or more candidates before the congregation for a vote, this would split the congregation and cause unnecessary conflict. Those whose choice wasn't ultimately selected would likely feel upset, disappointed, or slighted-not a good recipe for the start to a successful ministry.

## What if the search process doesn't work out?

From time to time, this does happen. This doesn't mean we've failed, it just means that we've done our best to find the right match, but are unwilling to settle. Later this year, there is an opportunity for candidates and search committees to reevaluate their choices, and new possibilities may arise. If not, we have done all of the preparatory work necessary for the UUFF to continue the search in the future.
