

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## Shelter in Place Drill During Mar 22 Service



Evacuation drills, like fire drills, are important. But what if for some reason we needed to stay INSIDE?

There are man-made and natural events where it may actually be better to shelter-in-place. While something like an “active shooter” or person with hostile intent often comes to mind (and understandably concerns many of us) in reality we are MUCH more likely to experience a wind event or hail. Yes, as those who live around here know, we sometimes get pretty strong winds and even the occasional tornado! So it’s important for us to be prepared for all types of events.

On March 22, we’ll be taking just a few minutes during Sunday Service to practice sheltering in place. Now, we know some may have concerns about drills. Some, especially parents, may feel they are triggers. When done with contextually-appropriate explanation, teaching, practice, and accommodation for special needs, safety drills can instead be very empowering and can build self-confidence and self-reliance, ESPECIALLY in children. Who wouldn’t want to be their very own Superhero?

In 32 years as an EMT, Paramedic, Firefighter, and Police Officer, I’m here to help address those fears. I can tell you that Chris Johns and the RE program, the Board, and the UUFF staff are supporting this 100%. RE staff will have already been trained and Kristen Tuxbury and I will be sitting down with the children during RE several weeks before to talk about safety. During the Wonder Box on March 22, I’ll even tell a fable about the empowerment of being prepared.

I know some may wish to avoid this service because of the safety drill. Please, whatever your reasons, we really hope you do attend and I very much invite you to talk with me ([uuff.emptf@gmail.com](mailto:uuff.emptf@gmail.com)) or Chris Johns about any questions or concerns.

## Art of Protest

The second annual art exhibit "Art of Protest: Protesting from the side of love" will take place from March 1 through April 26 at the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Fredericksburg Gallery. The opening reception will be on March 1 from 11:30 AM - 1:30 PM. The exhibition and reception are free and open to the public.

The three featured artists are Holly Cole, Carlos Moore, and Bill Johnson-Miles. Holly arrived in Fredericksburg for her retirement from teaching in 2015, but she knew Virginia well, since she grew up in Arlington and her Mom later moved to Lake Anna. A drama teacher at the University of Ohio, Holly took many years of costume design and applied her skills to the narrative quilts she now creates. She loves telling stories in her quilts and tries to convey her feelings in the imagery. In the quilt "Endangered Asian Elephants", for example, she lures the viewer into connecting with the tragedy of the near extinction of such a beautiful animal by having the viewer look deeply into the elephant's eye. She also uses a breakdown printing process to create images that are literally disappearing, "or reappearing if we can work to stop this loss".

Carlos Moore retired as an art teacher at Chancellor High School in Spotsylvania this past spring. He used his social-justice art as inspiration for his students to express themselves. Talking about complex and emotionally-charged images allowed students to express themselves in new and authentic ways, and that carried over to their own imagery. He believes we are primarily spiritual, and as artists we need to pay attention to the subconscious. "Every moment is a learning experience". The close-up of Lady Liberty, for example, shows a figure shrouded in shredded money. Sometimes a chance occurrence in creating evoked new areas of felt meaning. A strip of money covered her mouth, rendering her speechless. Her hands were bound in front of her in a way that suggested to students she was pregnant, suggesting she was subject to what society imposed upon her. She seems completely vulnerable. The lust for money by society has consumed her, students said. In talking with Carlos about teaching, it is clear that he was a devoted teacher. I am certain his students miss him, but he gave them many lessons to carry through life. The most important lesson was stated by a former student: "You're the only one who came up and showed me some love."

Bill Johnson-Miles is a social-justice leader at UUFF. He represented UUFF as clergy and lay leaders marched arm-in-arm in Charlottesville, singing "This Little Light of Mine" while neo-Nazis and other haters attacked them. As a retired 20-year Navy veteran, and a retired civil servant who worked for the Marine Corps for 11 years, he uses the core values of the Navy and Marine Corps to guide his life: Honor, Courage, and Commitment. He is a professional photographer and someone who documents many social justice movements. The photo-collage "New Zealand Tragedy" draws us in as part of the suffering.

These three artists use their passion and compassion to help convince the viewer that a better world is possible. They each enter the battleground for public memory in causes they care passionately about. Please visit the UUFF Gallery to see how various artists and activists engage the viewer in their causes.

### Monthly Theme: Wisdom

*Knowledge is a process of piling up facts; wisdom lies in their simplification.*

*- Martin H. Fischer*

The math of wisdom is often the opposite of what we think. It's more a game of subtraction than addition. Often, accumulation of knowledge doesn't get us closer to wisdom; it's just in the way. There's a sorting, simplifying and stripping away that needs to occur. It's about unknowing as much as knowing. Just think about how deeply we get tangled up in those cultural messages about money and success. Or the way degrees, IQs tests and SAT numbers get mixed up with status rather than the pursuit of truth. Or the way political parties, religions and even science claim to have *all* the answers. Maybe this is why the Sufi poet Hafiz wrote:

*The Beloved sometimes wants  
To do us a great favor:  
Hold us upside down  
And shake all the nonsense out.*

And with all the nonsense shaken out and stripped away, maybe what we notice most is not so much the pearls of wisdom themselves, but the sources of wisdom we've forgotten. When reason and logic hog the spotlight, the wisdom of the body rarely enters the room. When week-long retreats with the newest guru define the path to wisdom, we stop asking what our failures and mistakes are trying to teach us. When "experts" sit in the center, the wisdom of those on the margins is lost. So many untapped sources. So much wisdom waiting to be known. Makes one think that maybe the wisest question of all this month is: "Where have I not looked before?"

#### ***Simple Wisdom, Rev. Doug McCusker***

We live at a time of an over-abundance of information seducing us to cling to knowledge so we can get more done. But as Lin Yutan teaches us, besides the noble art of getting things done, there is the noble art of leaving things undone. The wisdom of life consists in the elimination of non-essentials so we may listen to that which we have stored in our guts and our hearts.

### **March 8**

#### ***A Service about Service, Rev. Doug McCusker***

Sometimes we wear a bib and we are served. And sometimes we wear an apron and serve others. That's what it means to be in community. Finding the right balance for the community and for ourselves is a source of great wisdom along our spiritual journey. Rev. Doug will talk about the ways we strengthen the bonds of compassionate relationship and engender a sense of belonging when we serve our community. After the worship service, the Community Action committee will hold a Community Service Fair where you can learn about all the ways the UUFF serves our Fredericksburg community and sign up to wear an apron in the service of others. Little Ringers will perform during the service.

### **March 15**

#### ***Moncure Conway, Gae Pinschmidt and Don Reed***

Moncure Conway is cited with George Washington as one of this region's two most consequential native sons. So why don't we know more about him? He, as a Southern Abolitionist, holds an honored place in local history. Most such individuals had concerns about the high cost of ownership; feeding, clothing and housing cadres of slaves. But Conway's concerns differed, specific as they were to the immorality of bondage, putting himself at serious odds with family and most of Falmouth. Raised a Methodist, his sojourn through Harvard Divinity School, exposed him to Free Thought and Free Thinkers who broadened his perceptions, so that he emerged a Unitarian Minister whose very first pulpit installed him in prestigious First Unitarian Church, in the capitol. His next installation took him to a Unitarian pulpit in Ohio, immersing him in danger and controversy throughout the Civil War. Today's presentation makes a case for tradition in terms of an annual Moncure Conway Sunday Service, reprising his sermons and perspectives. He is our good friend and neighbor. An annual Sunday Service honoring his lifelong constancy to the cause of abolition and civil rights is at hand.

### **March 22**

#### ***How to be a Super-Hero, Rev. Doug McCusker***

Who are the real super-heroes in your life? What were their powers and vulnerabilities that served as the sources of their strength? To whom are you a super-hero? By identifying our own vulnerabilities and powers we can learn how to better ask our community for help and to offer help to our community. When we accept assistance and watch out

for others, we maintain the flow of our interdependence and everyone is saved. We will be having a Shelter-in-Place drill during the service to be better prepared in the event of an emergency.

**March 29**

**Radical Love and Inclusion, Rev. Doug McCusker**

Unitarian Universalism has embarked on a journey within. To examine and dismantle the barriers we have erected around our historical center of power so we can truly become a faith of radical love and inclusion. This requires us to welcome and listen to the wisdom of those who have lived on the margins. To lovingly have those conversations we need to have with each other, that we must have with each other.
